So please, *be a treasure hunter*. Help us compile a complete **Idaho Military History**. If you have any questions, contact us at 422-6128.




Richard T. Clemens

One day in the spring of 1934, a young man "joined up" with Troop E of the 116th Cavalry Regiment. Young indeed, he was sixteen years old and had a yen to be horse soldier. Those aspirations served him well if only to survive the screening for under age recruits. He was Richard (Dick) Clemens and the troop, a unit of the Idaho National Guard, was in Boise.

In those days they had to 'make do' with a shortage of equipment as the long roll of the drums of war sounded more ominously through the 1930's. That drumming portended a life more demanding than the drill nights and summer camp for Guardsmen.

The army saw no future for the horse in the looming threat so in September, 1940, the 116th Cavalry was converted via the magic of Special Order #147, A.G.O. Idaho, to the 183rd Field Artillery and two other battalions.



This Idaho FA battalion was mobilized into Federal service on April 1, 1941, and scrt to Fort Warren, Wyoming.


To make a long story short, Trooper Clemens, now 25 years old, was Captain Clemens, Commander, Battery A, 183rd FA, upon debarking in England in December 1943 (the Army commissioned nearly 80,000 officers from Guard enlisted ranks by the end of the war).

The battalion landed at Utah Beach on D plus 9 and began firing in support of VII Corps, First Army, to which they would be assigned for the rest of the war. At different times they fired in support of the



4th, 9th, 30th, 35th, 79th, and 83rd Infantry Divisions, as well as the 2nd Armored Division, the 3rd AD and other combat units.

On July 28, in the breakout from Normandy into northern France, Clemens was ordered to reposition one howitzer (155mm) in an orchard and fire registration rounds for the battalion. This would speed the adjustment of other guns to arrive later.



With twelve men, he completed that mission when the were warned of the approach of elements of the German 2nd SS Panzer Division and the 275th Infantry. This involved 250-300 enemy troops moving in from the direction and a Tiger tank approaching from their rear.

Captain Clemens set up a defensive line of Idahoans armed only with M-1 carbines and one fifty-caliber machine gun. Although they inflicted heavy losses on the Germans, they could not stop their advance and Clemens radioed for tank support.

Captain Clemens was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross, thirteen of his men received the Silver Star and eighteen received the Bronze Star for valor.

Upon checking to the rear, he also located an enemy machine gun set up at a crossroads. Clemens reorganized his men and attacked the enemy flank during which he and fourteen of his men were wounded.

Firing at the enemy tank commander brought return fire from the tank's 88-mm gun. However, other elements of the 183rd arrived and, with the Clemens group, engaged the enemy in heavy fighting. These units of the 183rd finally forced retreat of the Germans who suffered about 100 killed and 150 prisoners.

The 183rd lost eight men (including the battalion commander) and fourteen were wounded, nearly all Idahoans. Captain Clemens was awarded the *Distinguished Service Cross*, thirt—an of his men received the *Silver Sīar* and eighteen received the *Bronze Star* for valor.



In the breal out from Normandy, the 183rd took part in the VII Corps attack via the St. Lo Gap and in the

trapping of the German Fifth and Seventh Armies in the Falaise pocket. The battalion and VII Corps remained with First Army across France and into Germany. That December, the 183rd was pulled back to defend the allies' northern flank in the Battle of the Bulge.

The Idaho unit then saw the end of the war in action in the north of Germany. After eleven months of combat, the men of Idaho's 183rd FA Battalion were finally on their way home to the strains of "Sentimental Journey".



After the war, Clemens remained active with the National Guard and Army Reserve. He retired as a colonel after thirty years of service.



ENDOWMENT PROGRAM

With the stock market at an all-time high, now may be the right time to make a gift to the IMHS Endowment Program.

A person giving an outright gift of appreciated stock to the Endowment immediately gains three tax savings.

- For donors who itemize tax deductions, it is a charitable income tax deduction in the year given.
- The donor avoids payment of capital gains on the appreciated value of the stock.



3 It reduces the donor's taxable estate by the amount of the gift.

Another way of donating stock is to set up a charitable gift annuity funded with appreciated stock.

This type of a donation sets up a lifetime annuity with the balance of the annuity going to the Endowment after all annuity payments are made. Tax benefits in this plan are similar to those for outright gift donors.

These types of donations are very easy to set up. Assistance can be

In addition to saving taxes, a person's donation to the Endowment Program supports the Museum, the Reference Library, and the Education Outreach program.
